Who is an "authorised person"?

An authorised person is a person who, under regulations, is in a list of professions (Part 1) or in a number of employment groups (part 2) - see below. Such a person, by virtue of being of that profession or in that employment group, is an ex officio commission for declarations.

Where an ex officio commissioner signs in that capacity it is necessary to add after the words "Commissioner for Declarations" the profession or class of employment by virtue of which he/she is an ex officio commissioner (eg "nurse" or "permanent employee - Tas Government").
